"Statistics demonstrate that women have been very attracted to public accounting in recent years," says Teresita Fuentes, Tax Partner and Certified Public Accountant at Ernst & Young (E&Y), "we have a commitment to provide the flexibility women need in order to grow professionally and fulfill their personal needs."

E&Y has said that more women are attaining higher positions within the firm and that the future looks even brighter.

Billie Williamson, Gender Equity and Flexibility Strategy Leader of E&Y said, "making the transition back into the workplace following a parental leave can be a difficult time for many women who struggle with being a mother and a professional, and ask themselves how they can do it all."
